Head Lice



Background

In early childhood education and care services, children have close contact with each other, and this provides the opportunity for head lice to be transferred from child to child.

Whilst parents have primary responsibility for the detection and treatment of head lice, the Service will work in a cooperative and collaborative manner to assist all families to manage head lice effectively.

Policy statement

This policy outlines the roles, responsibilities and expectations of the Service and parents to assist with a consistent and coordinated approach to treating and controlling head lice.

Strategies and practices

- The Services *Head Lice Policy* and up-to-date and accurate information on the detection, treatment and control of head lice is available at the Service for parents and educators.
- Children do not share hats or bedding at the Service.
- Parents of children with long hair are asked to tie their hair back before coming to the Service.
- Parents are asked to check children's hair regularly for head lice. Parents are expected to
 ensure that their child does not attend the Service with untreated head lice. Parents are asked
 to notify the Service if their child is found to have live lice and when appropriate treatment
 was commenced.
- Parents of a child found to have head lice while at the Service are contacted and asked to treat the child before they next attend the Service. A Head Lice Notification Form is sent home and parents are asked to return the form to the Service signed to confirm the treatment of their child's hair.
- The Service provides all parents with a <u>Head Lice Notification</u> when head lice has occurred in the Service. All parents are provided with information and are asked to check their own child's head daily once head lice have been detected in the Service.
- After a case of head lice has been detected in the Service, all items such as hats, bedding and dress-up clothes which may have been used by the child are washed in hot soapy water and hung out to dry in the sun.

Additional safe practices for babies

No additional practices required.

Responsibilities of parents

To tie back their child's long hair.

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- To check children's hair regularly for head lice and advise the Service if head lice are detected.
- To treat their child's hair in the event of head lice being detected.
